What does it mean to be 'wise'? To know a lot of stuff? To be educated to a certain level? To have a lot of experience? To be old in years? I remember being at University and one of my Theology lecturers was extremely intelligent and knowledgeable, but his lectures were so boring! He didn't know how to use the knowledge he had to create engaging lectures, which were inspiring and meaningful for the students. Being wise is much more than just being 'smart'. It is about knowing how to use the knowledge we have to make good choices and inspiring others to do the same.

One person who is particularly known and revered for their wisdom is King Solomon. A well-known example of Solomon's wisdom is his judgment in a dispute over the identity of the actual mother of an infant child (1 Kings 3:16-28). Solomon offered to split the living child in half, understanding that the true mother would prefer to lose her son to another woman than to have him killed. Solomon was not only wise in his rule as King but had excellent general wisdom as well, and multiple books are attributed to him in the Bible.

The Christian Bible is full to the brim with wisdom, whether that be found in the traditional Book of Proverbs in the Old Testament or the parables Jesus told during his ministry, which can be found in the New testament. 
Enthuse Partnership

Safeguarding

As we approach the end of Term 5, we continue to work collaboratively across the campus, to ensure that we keep our young people safe. This week, we will be delivering an important session on Exploitation in Knife Crime Awareness week to our year 7 - 10 students.

Children (up to the age of 18 as in the legal definition), are inherently more vulnerable than the adults around them. They are generally physically less powerful and in almost all cases their voices are not heard as prominently. Sometimes, even when their voice is heard it isn't believed, or isn't given the same weight as the opinion of adults around them. This leads to a situation where children might be exploited.

Child Exploitation occurs where an adult, or a group of adults, takes advantage of the power imbalance that exists, to coerce, control, manipulate or deceive a child or young person under the age of 18. Children can be exploited by other children on occasion too. Typically, a child has done a certain act which is referenced by some exchange (of goods, payments, relationship or increased status in a group).

Our constant vigilance and reporting and recording of the seemingly "smaller" situations and comments, builds up a picture that might demonstrate a child is not safe and is potentially being exploited.

BREADTH OF CHILD EXPLOITATION

This might be the key information needed for agencies, such as the police and the safeguarding hubs in local

authority areas, who often aim to work pro-actively to disrupt perpetrators, to act and keep children safe from all types of exploitation happening in the local area.

It is important to remember that child exploitation can occur anywhere, and involve anyone.

We must look out for the key risks and signs of child exploitation in order to protect the children in our care, all of whom are vulnerable to this kind of abuse. Thank you for your support.

Young Carers

Is your child a young carer?

A young carer looks after someone within their family home, a parent, sibling, or other family member. A young carer supports someone who is ill, has a disability, or has mental health issues. Or maybe the person has difficulties with alcohol or drugs and are unable to care for themselves. Caring for someone may involve physically supporting someone with daily tasks, such as dressing, cooking, and cleaning if the family member cannot do these things. They may also offer regular emotional care, such as comforting, listening and talking to the person they care for, which causes them stress, worry, or anxiety.

If your child is caring for someone at home, we know young carers can sometimes struggle to balance all aspects of their life, so please get in touch so your child can be supported at school and signposted to other services for support.
